

Projects Overview

High School #8
Two workers digging a trench inside the existing campus area.
Trenchwork continues to progress throughout the site.

New construction of High School #8 continues with sitework. Sitework for this reporting period includes major trenchwork for sewer, water and electrical connections. Abatement of hazardous materials in the existing classroom buildings (old Curtis Middle School) also continues. Construction funds have been apportioned but not released due to the State's current budget deficit. This funding freeze includes funding of four new campus projects as depicted in the schedule bar chart on page 3. Interim or "bridge" funding may be secured so that construction may continue uninterrupted on this project to avoid costly contractor work stoppage delays and to take advantage of the competitive bidding market. Completion of final design and acquisition of land also drives the start of construction for the four new campus projects.









Land Acquisition

The District continues to acquire real estate parcels with 248 of 265 (93%) purchase agreements in place. Eminent domain proceedings were initiated in Superior Court for eight properties: two each at the Roosevelt II and Alessandro II sites and four at the Burbank II site. Pre-construction work continues and includes fencing and boarding up properties. Soils and materials testing, associated abatement, and demolition is expected to start once all ongoing environmental due diligence is complete and reports are processed by the District.

Five of the 36 modernization projects started construction earlier this year. Fair-fax and Warm Springs Elementary School projects (Package 4R) are complete. Work at these two sites consisted of access upgrades to campus paths of travel and restrooms. Upgrades include railings, ramps, restroom fixtures, doors and associated hardware.

San Gorgonio High School modernization continues in Building C. This first of three phases encompasses upgrades to lighting, heating, plumbing, with the installation of new restrooms, skylights, and hydronic piping. Interior finishes include new paint, flooring, ceiling tiles to name just a few.

Initial stages of work began recently for Package 5, Hillside and Hunt Elementary Schools modernization project. Scope of work consists of access upgrades similar to Fairfax and Warm Springs Elementary Schools projects.

The remaining 31 projects are scheduled to start construction over the course of the next 12 months with bid packages staggered for bid and award over the next 6 months as depicted in the Project Schedules bar chart on page 5. Already out for bid/award is Package 1 (Lincoln, Riley and Salinas) with an anticipated notice to proceed with construction this month, July 2009.

The first phase of the Arroyo Valley High School stadium project has been completed. The first phase involved the construction of two new bleachers on each side of the existing box stand bleachers. These new bleachers include ADA-compliant accessibility points and seating. On June 10th, the graduating senior class was able to walk for the first time onto the new field.

All eight sites are on schedule for completion staggered throughout the summer from June through August 2009. In an effort to save money, where there are imminent modernization projects scheduled at the same site, the SDC will be used to house students while their classrooms are being renovated. Using these buildings as temporary, or "interim", student housing is a cost saving alternative to leasing portable classrooms. The cost savings realized by this plan are added to the school's modernization budget to fund additional improvements.


One of the most important factors in maintaining a safe learning environment is the cleanliness of classrooms and other facilities. The custodial staff serves as the first line of defense keeping hazards and germs out of the way and every building looking its best. These unsung heroes work tirelessly behind the scenes to ensure that every child who attends a SBCUSD school is safe.

The custodial staff is divided into two shifts: one during the day and one that handles tasks after hours. Altogether, about 140 staff members handle every site in the District, including all schools, the Board of Education building, annex buildings (Smart, WHAA, etc.), and the District offices at the Carousel Mall.



Maintenance & Operations Remodel

Construction at the Maintenance & Operations building is near completion. All of the office space at the front of the building has been remodeled and furniture is being assembled at the new location. As part of the process, new offices east of the existing offices were constructed and some of the shop areas were reconfigured. Electrical, plumbing, structural, and other upgrade work has also been completed. The remaining project, a new conference room at the front of the building, will be built and completed after the Facilities staff moves in.



The Facilities staff transitioned from the Board of Education building to the Maintenance and Operations building over a two week period at the end of June. The first week was devoted to packing up files and belongings. During the second week, while furniture and boxes were moved, the department held training sessions and unpacked at the end of the week. On July 1st, the department was moved in and ready for operation at their new home.
