

Projects Overview

Board of Education Breaks Ground at Indian Springs High School

On March 5th, the Board of Education officially held a ground-breaking ceremony for Indians Springs High School. Guests included members of the San Manuel Mission tribe and a representative from Mayor Pat Morris' office, along with members of the Board of Education and Superintendent Dr. Arturo Delgado.

Behind the scenes, construction on the site continues. Wall footings for additional new buildings have been constructed. Facades have also been raised for several buildings. Slab has been poured for the gymnasium. Concrete for the tennis courts are now in. Ball walls are up. Framing for two non-masonry buildings has begun. A concrete block for the records room is up. Inside the existing buildings, work continues on the framing of new walls. HVAC work has also started inside. Two buildings are in the process of being combined into one building. Wall footings and bricks have been laid where the new exterior walls will be.

New Campus Pre-construction Work

Pre-construction work at several other new campus sites has also begun. The first of two phases of demolition work at Norton Elementary School is completed. Notice Inviting Bids (NIBs) were sent out for demolition and abatement services for the remainder of Norton Elementary School and for Middle College High School. Once approved by the Board, demolition work for both sites are scheduled to begin in early May.

In late February, historic tiles were removed from the fireplaces of several properties on the Brown Elementary School site. Some of the tiles removed will be cleaned and stored to reconstruct those fireplaces in various locations on the new campus.



Land Acquisition

The District continues to acquire real estate parcels with 257 of 265 (97%) purchase agreements in place. Eminent domain proceedings were initiated in Superior Court for four properties at the Dominguez ES site. Properties at Henry ES and Gomez ES sites were awarded through eminent domain court proceedings. Pre-construction work continues and includes fencing and boarding up properties. Soils and materials testing, associated abatement, and demolition is expected to start once all ongoing environmental due diligence is completed, approvals from DTSC are obtained, and reports are processed by the District.




Employee Spotlight

Building Schools, Building Communities

This is the third part of a series of articles where we examine the eight future campus projects and highlight how these campuses will benefit the communities they will serve.

Capt. Leland Norton Elementary School

Location 8th Street, bounded by Sierra Way, Victoria Street, Mtn. View Avenue, San Bernardino

The closing of Norton Air Force Base in 1995 left San Bernardino with no memorial honoring local war hero Capt. Leland Francis Norton. That has now changed with the Board naming the Lincoln II South site as Capt. Leland Norton Elementary School. San Bernardino once again has a tribute to a man who sacrificed his life defending his country and saving the lives of the men who served under him.

Capt. Norton was killed in action during World War II while flying over Amiens, France. He was dive-bombing a target in his A-20 "Havoc" attack bomber when his plane was struck by anti-aircraft fire. Capt. Norton ordered his crew to leave the plane while he tried to regain control. His plane crashed soon afterwards.


Scheduled for completion in 2012, the school will serve as a fitting tribute to Capt. Norman. Located by Seccombe Lake, Norton Elementary School will serve 876 students inside 36 classrooms. The 13.4 acre site will feature all of the amenities of a modern-day elementary school, including food service facilities, a multi-use room, and a library. The campus will also help alleviate some of the overcrowding at nearby elementary schools.

Projects Overview

Work on Building B at San Gorgonio High School (Group 3) is nearing completion. While students are off during spring break, teachers, staff and student volunteers will be moving classrooms and the library back into the building. At the same time, additional small-scale projects will also be performed around the campus. The next buildings scheduled for modernization are the cafeteria and Building D, which includes the gymnasium.

Progress is also being made at Hillside and Hunt Elementary Schools (Group 5). At Hunt, work on Building D has been completed and has now moved on to the portable classrooms. Meanwhile, Building B at Hillside is finished and the focus is on Building C. A new handrail and ramp system alongside Building C, leading out to the front of the school, is also being constructed at Hillside.

Group 1 campuses (Salinas Creative Arts, Lincoln, and Riley Elementary Schools) con-

tinue to move forward with their projects. Wiring in the ceilings at Lincoln previously in disarray are now tidied

up. HVAC work has also started inside. Floor demolition

and trenching has started for a new main electrical service that will power the entire school. At Riley, additional demolition work has started in the northern part of the campus and to the paths of travel outside the perimeter. Some staff restrooms are completely remodeled. Openings for new skylights have been cut out. Meanwhile, work on two restrooms at Salinas continues with new drywall installation.

Modernization work has started at several of Group 6 campuses (Anderson Special Education; Del Rosa, Monterey, and Wilson Elementary Schools). At Anderson, abatement inside of two classrooms and an adjoining restroom is completed. Frames for a new ceiling system have already been installed inside the two classrooms. A restroom located between two classrooms, as well as some work on paths of travel, have started at Del Rosa. Restroom remodeling has also starting at Monterey.



Paint Shop

What's one of the quickest ways to improve the appearance of a room or a building and boost the mood and morale at the same time? Put on a fresh coat of paint. Not only does this freshen up a room, but it also reinforces the commitment the District has towards their students and teachers, thus improving morale at the schools. This is the main job of the Paint Shop. The shop uses a wide variety of paints (oil, latex, direct to metal), stains, varnishes, lacquers, and equipment to get the job done. They prepare new and previously painted surfaces for painting, remove graffiti off of walls, and apply protective and decorative coatings. The shop also plans, lays out, and re-stripes playgrounds, parking lots, and gymnasiums. Signs are also produced through the Paint Shop. They also support the other shops by erecting scaffolding when needed. And, as required by the Air Quality Management District (AQMD), they maintain records on consumption use and report back to the AQMD.
