

#### **Projects Overview**

Progress continues at the Indian Springs High School site. Framing for the exterior walls to new buildings are starting to be raised. Non-masonry buildings have also been framing and walls are being boarded up. Additional concrete slabs are poured inside the new structures. Modernization work on existing buildings continues with the installation of HVAC ductwork and other utilities. Drywall installation has started inside some of the buildings and will continue as time progresses. New exterior door and window frames are also being installed.

At the Brown Elementary School site, following the removal of historic tiles last month, abatement work has started on the standing structures. Asbestos roofs and tile floors,

as well as doors, windows, and drywall containing lead were removed off of the site. Once the structures were completely abated, some of them were used for training by the San Bernardino City Fire Department to practice

a technique known as a roof breach. A roof breach allows a firefighter to vent heat and smoke out of a burning structure by cutting an opening into the roof. Once all of the properties have been abated, demolition of the buildings will then begin.





#### **Land Acquisition**

The District continues to acquire real estate parcels with 257 of 265 (97%) purchase agreements in place. Eminent domain proceedings were initiated in Superior Court for four properties at the Dominguez ES site. Properties at Henry ES and Gomez ES sites were awarded through eminent domain court proceedings. Pre-construction work continues and includes fencing and boarding up properties. Soils and materials testing, associated abatement, and demolition is expected to start once all ongoing environmental due diligence is completed, approvals from DTSC are obtained, and reports are processed by the District.

This is the fourth in a series of articles where we examine the eight future campus projects and highlight how these campuses will benefit the communities they will serve.

#### George Brown, Jr. Elementary School

Location 26th Street, between G and F Streets, San Bernardino


George Brown, Jr. served as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives, representing various parts of Southern California during his 35-year career. His last six years were spent serving as representative for the city of San Bernardino. He is most notable for his efforts in shaping American policy as related to the sciences. As a member of the House Sciences Committee, Rep. Brown helped with the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency, the establishment of the Office of Science and Technology Policy Executive Office of the President, and was one of the first to help fund research on climate change in 1978. Outside of the sciences, Rep. Brown was a strong advocate of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and fought hard for its passage. Rep. Brown died in 1999 while serving in office.


Brown Elementary School is tentatively scheduled to open during the second quarter of 2012. The 9-acre site will contain 30 classrooms that will house about 900 students. Located right next to Arrowview Middle School and close to San Bernardino High School, Brown will be part of an education system that will increase academic accountability and form the foundation for smaller neighborhood learning communities.

#### **Projects Overview**

**Group 1** The first set of remodeled restrooms at Lincoln Elementary School are completed and reopened. New HVAC roof units and ductwork are being installed at Building C. Work on concrete flatwork around the perimeter of the building continues. At Riley Elementary School, skylights have now been installed and concrete flatwork is being performed on the surrounding perimeter. The restroom remodel at Salinas Creative Arts is now completed. Additional work will resume during the summer.

**Group 3** The renovations that had taken place over the past several months inside Building B at San Gorgonio High School are complete. During spring break, teachers moved their classes back inside. Classes are now being held inside the reopened building. The library inside also reopened with books stacked back onto the shelves. Work is about to start on Building D and the cafeteria.

**Group 5** With the exception of a couple of restrooms, work on Building C at Hillside Elementary School is completed. Also completed is a new walkway leading

from Building C to the front of the school. Work has now started on another wing of Building B. At Hunt Elementary School, new handrails have been installed along some paths of travel. Work on the portables continues, as well as another wing of Building B. With help from the Maintenance & Operations Department, fixtures inside restrooms have been moved to meet ADA requirements and repairs to the roof have resulted in additional savings on this group.

**Group 6** At Anderson Special Education, new floors have been installed and cabinetry work is about to begin. A boys' restroom at Monterey Elementary School is finished being remodeled. New ramps are currently under construction in front of some classrooms. The restroom remodels at Del Rosa Elementary School are near completion. New walls for the restrooms have been framed, and drywall and tile installation is completed.

Groups 2, 4, and 7 These three modernization groups, consisting of 11 schools, were recently approved by the Board of Education and are scheduled to begin work in the coming weeks.


#### Takara Russ Senior Clerk—Use of Facilities

#### **Maintenance & Operations Clerks**

With everything that Maintenance & Operations does in the District throughout the day, it can be easy to forget that there are a lot of behind-the-scenes work that takes place that allows all of that activity to happen. There are dispatchers who direct workers on where to go when there's an emergency. If something doesn't get done, they have to investigate why it didn't happen. They determine if a call placed by a site should be charged or not. They make sure all 10 shops are well-stocked with supplies so that they are able to perform their jobs at the level expected from them. They act as liaisons with other departments within the District so that the shops can focus on the tasks at hand. They ensure that all 250 employees of Maintenance & Operations and Facilities, as well as substitute workers, all get paid or are able to take a much-needed vacation. Finally, paperwork gets generated, processed, and filed to keep track of all the activity that takes place.
